



AWARDS AND BURSARIES

Thanks to the generous funding provided by award donors, Nipissing University is able to provide additional funding to students on the basis of a range of criteria.

Some of these are awarded based on academic merit, while others are for students demonstrating financial need, or a combination of extracurricular involvement, academics, demonstrated leadership ability, or volunteerism.

Once you're a Nipissing student, you just need to complete the Web Bursary application that is posted on Web Advisor the whole month of October to be considered for all of the "upper year" funding available. If you think you might have a financial shortfall, apply — you might just get some extra funding!

■ AUTOMATIC UPPER YEAR CARL SANDERS SCHOLARSHIPS

Students qualify for the guaranteed upper year scholarships on the basis of their overall average on the top 24 credits taken at Nipissing in the previous fall/winter session. Scholarships are paid out in the subsequent year, as long as the student is registered in at least 18 credits. The scholarships may be held for a maximum of four years.

■ GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE

The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) is available to Ontario residents who are Canadian citizens and/or who are permanent residents of Canada.

Funding is available to students for full-and part-time study. Full time OSAP provides funding for direct educational costs and an allowance for living costs, local travel and childcare, if applicable. Funding is based on a need calculation performed by the government.

Part time OSAP provides funding for direct educational costs (i.e. tuition, ancillary fees, books and supplies) and is based on whether your previous year's income meets the government thresholds set each year. In both cases, funding may be provided in the form of loans and/or grants, depending on individual circumstances.

■ NUWORK: ON-CAMPUS WORK STUDY PROGRAM

Nipissing University offers a Work Study program that enables students to work part-time on campus. Students must first qualify for the program by submitting an application that may be printed from the forms section of our website:

nipissingu.ca/studentfinancialservices. Notification of eligibility is sent to Nipissing University email accounts. Once eligibility is confirmed, students may apply to work in a NUWork-eligible position. The majority of work study positions begin in September so students are encouraged to apply in August. It is expected that students will have explored all possible funding options, including OSAP, before applying for this program. Interested in Law School?

No specific degree or major is required for admission into Law School. Nipissing offers all prerequisite courses required for admission into Ontario Law Schools. A minimum of two to three years of undergraduate study will provide eligibility.



Interested in Medical School?

No specific degree or major is required for admission to Medical School. Nipissing offers all prerequisite courses required for admission to Ontario Medical Schools. A minimum of three years of undergraduate study, plus a few specific courses (depending on the medical school of choice) will provide eligibility. Some Medical Schools require specific courses for admission consideration. Typically courses are in the areas of Biology, Biochemistry, General or Organic Chemistry, or Physical Sciences and Life Sciences. Some may require Humanities and/or Social Science courses.



Interested in an MBA?

No specific degree or major is required for admission into a Master of Business Administration program. Nipissing offers all prerequisite courses required. A minimum of three years of undergraduate study, plus a few specific courses (depending on grad school of choice) will provide eligibility.



Interested in Veterinary Medicine?

No specific degree or major is required for admission to Veterinary Medicine. Nipissing offers all prerequisite courses required for admission into Veterinary Medicine. Typically applicants are required to complete courses in Biology and Genetics, as well as Math and/or Statistics for admission consideration. A minimum of two to three years of undergraduate study is required to apply.

Education student earns volunteer medal

Nipissing University's Aboriginal Advantage Program is a full-time, first year transition-to-university program for Indigenous students who are planning to pursue an undergraduate degree, and may want or need additional cultural, personal, and/or academic resources.

Students who are transitioning from high school, upgrading, entering from a college program, or who have simply taken a break from their studies are eligible to apply to the program.

You will be part of a community of peers, staff, faculty and Elders while obtaining 24 credits toward a university degree in pre-selected courses reserved for AAP students. You will:

- learn alongside other Indigenous students;
- attend orientation week to meet the professors and other students in the program;
- become more familiar with the university system; and
- gain confidence to be successful at university.

The Indigenous Teacher Education Program (ITEP) diploma/degree program is available for individuals of Indigenous ancestry. You are eligible if you have successfully completed one of the following from an accredited university or college:

- An undergraduate degree
- Early Childhood Education (ECE)
- Aboriginal/Native Classroom Assistant Diploma Program (ACADP/NCADP)
- Native Language Teaching Certificate (NLTC)

This summer intensive program prepares individuals to develop teaching strategies, technological skills and curriculum knowledge within an indigenous worldview. The program's structure allows working professionals to attend classes in the summer and to return to employment during the academic year. Upon completion, successful applicants will earn a Certificate of Qualification from the Ontario College of Teachers in the Primary/Junior Divisions.

INDIGENOUS CLASSROOM ASSISTANT DIPLOMA PROGRAM (ICADP)

The Indigenous Classroom Assistant Diploma Program (ICADP) offers its candidates the opportunity to explore the role of the classroom assistant who works with Indigenous children in elementary public and First Nation schools. Students explore culturally relevant pedagogical understandings in working with elementary students of all academic levels in numerous subject areas. Practicum experiences allow students to connect educational theory with practical applications in the classroom and the entire school. Our graduates return to their classrooms with newly acquired skills and knowledge gained from the Indigenous Classroom Assistant Diploma Program to assist Indigenous children in elementary classrooms across the province.

TEACHER OF INDIGENOUS LANGUAGE AS A SECOND LANGUAGE (TILSL)

The TILSL Program provides students who are fluent in the languages of Anishnaabemwin, Cree, Lunaape, Mohawk and Cayuga the opportunity to earn a Diploma in Education from Nipissing University and a Certificate of Qualification and Registration from the Ontario College of Teachers. You will acquire a thorough understanding of new technologies as well as necessary strategies to deliver

Indigenous traditional teachings and Indigenous languages as a subject within First Nation and Ontario public schools from grades Kindergarten to 12. The program's structure allows working professionals to attend classes in the summer and to return to employment during the academic year.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

BIIDAABAN COMMUNITY SERVICE-LEARNING

Biidaaban is an Anishnaabe word that means: "dawn, that point when the sun is rising and a new day begins." Biidaaban Community Service-Learning (BCSL) is a unique experiential learning program. Through volunteer placements in community organizations, students apply classroom theory to real-world experiences. Students make a difference by investing time and energy in the local community, putting classroom learning into practice. BCSL builds meaningful relationships with local communities. A specialized focus of BCSL is increasing literacy and numeracy with Indigenous youth through Biidaaban Youth Groups and Biidaaban Academic Support programs. BCSL participants receive training from Educators, Elders and Faculty prior to engaging with community.

WIIDOOKTAADWIN INDIGENOUS MENTORSHIP INITIATIVES

Wiidooktaadwin is an Anishnaabe word that means "helping one another." Wiidooktaadwin connects Indigenous Nipissing University students with Indigenous youth in local secondary schools. Every school year begins with an opening by an Elder in a teaching circle. Seven sessions are led by mentors in the schools, framed in the Seven Grandfather Teachings. Topics covered in Mentor sessions include leadership in community, working together, and the importance of sharing our gifts. University Mentors are asked to participate in a weekend of training, and volunteer for 2 hours weekly over 8 weeks in the Fall. In the Fall and Spring, we host two Aasgaabwitaadwin Indigenous Youth Leadership Conferences on campus. Aasgaabwitaadwin is an Anishnaabe word meaning "we are standing in support of one another." Aasgaawitaadwin culminates in a celebration of the Wiidooktaadwin Mentorship Program for mentors, students, teachers, and community.

Secondary schools participating include: Nbisiing, Chippewa, Northern, Scollard Hall, West Ferris, and Widdifield.









Suite-style residence (sample layout)

Programs - On Campus

The BBA and BComm programs within the School of Business are designed for both secondary school graduates and working professionals. You can choose to specialize in one of the five Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) streams: Accounting, Economics, Finance, Marketing, Organizational Studies or Technology Management. Regardless of your choice of focus, you will gain the advantage of both in-depth business knowledge and broad personal experiences to prepare for your future career. In addition, the School of Business believes in the importance of experiential learning opportunities through our iLEAD Initiative which offers academic credit and a Business Experience Certificate for internships, international expeditions, and engaging with faculty members in research.

Distance Learning Programs - Online delivery

The School of Business has made both the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) and the Bachelor of Commerce (BComm) programs available to students completely through online delivery using a learning management system called Blackboard. The program is open to students in both Canada and around the world with no requirement to come to campus. Students can elect to take from one to fifteen courses per year, and may be able to fast track by obtaining transfer credit or advanced standing based on previously obtained education. There are fast track opportunities for 2- and 3-year college diplomas, university transfers and a new pathway for graduates of 3-year Advanced Technology diplomas (many streams) who are eligible for a business degree completion program through online delivery.

Degree Completion for College Graduates

Offered to graduates of advanced business administration diplomas (any stream) from our college partners, Algonquin College — Ottawa; Centennial College — Toronto; Lambton College — Sarnia; Niagara College — Niagara-on-the-Lake; and St. Clair College — Windsor.

The BBA and BComm degree completion programs are delivered at our college partner sites with a combination of in-class and live streamed lectures and online course delivery options. Students can complete their BComm degree in as little as 12 months and BBA degree in as little as 16 months. The BBA degree completion programs meet the standard requirements for many MBA programs as well as the unified accounting CPA designation, while the BComm degree meets the standard requirements for the HRPA CHRL designation; these completion programs are a solid complement to any advanced diploma in business.

Dr. Carly Dokis, Assistant Professor of Anthropology, is working with Anishinaabe communities in Northern Ontario on the ways that risk calculation around water quality is constructed, and how water is known and experienced by community members. One of the strengths of this research program, funded by SSHRC, is the adoption of an exploratory methodology established cooperatively with Dokis First Nation, which involves exchanging accounts about a common theme in the form of storycircles. Storycircles bring together an interdisciplinary team of knowledge holders and expertise to better understand the subjective and affective consequences of water quality risks for Indigenous peoples in Canada — an issue of direct importance to Indigenous communities, policy-makers, scholars, and the general public.



Bachelor of Arts (three-year)

Offered by the Faculty of Arts and Science

Economics is the study of how society allocates its scarce resources to satisfy needs and wants. An understanding of economics is essential for understanding how the world works. Why do we have economic booms followed by periods of slow growth and high unemployment? What determines the prices of the products we buy? How can the standard of living be so vastly different across countries? How and should the government intervene in the economy? Economics is concerned with the social science behind these kinds of questions. Our Economics program examines theories and concepts that help explain how the economy works and emphasizes how economics is connected to other disciplines such as business administration, finance, geography, political science, and psychology. The study of economics also includes the critical examination of government policies that impact on individuals, markets, and society in general.

By analyzing and writing about texts of all kinds, you develop communication skills (oral and written), critical thinking, research and organizational abilities. Discussion is core to the program at every level, culminating in intensive Honours Seminars in Fourth Year, where small groups of students can explore topics such as Early Modern Cross-dressing, Cannibalism, the Victorian Fantastic, *The Lord of the Rings* and American War Culture.

Bachelor of Science (BSc — four years)

Offered by the Faculty of Arts and Science

Collaborative Nipissing University and Canadore College Program — On-campus delivery

Nipissing University and its diverse ecological landscape of forests, lakes, streams, trails and waterfalls is the ideal location for studying Ecology and the Environment and we encourage you to check out all of the degrees we offer. Our Environmental Biology and Technology (ENBT) program specializes in providing you with the knowledge and skills required to study Environmental Biology from many perspectives. You will gain a solid background in Biology and Chemistry during year 1 at Nipissing. Year 2 will be spent at Canadore College (conveniently located right next door) to learn a wealth of practical skills. Years 3 and 4, you will return to Nipissing for upper year courses that provide specialty knowledge, research experiences, and internship opportunities. You will have access to state-of-theart facilities, which include a central analytical lab, an automated greenhouse. a wilderness research Preserve with access to pristine lakes and forests, animal care facilities, plant growth facilities, Herbarium, a confocal microscopy unit and a genomics/gene expression lab. This unique university/college approach creates highly employable graduates who have a solid mix of practical and theoretical skills. All courses are normally completed within four years, and you will emerge with both a Bachelor of Science degree from Nipissing University and an Environmental Technician — Protection and Compliance diploma from Canadore College. A number of special certificates can also be earned by ENBT students.



Dr. Kirsten Greer, Assistant Professor in Geography and History, is a trained historical geographer and holds the Canada Research Chair (CRC) in Global Environmental Histories and Geographies. Her research focus is on the global environmental histories and geographies of two key semi-periphery areas: Ontario's Near North; and the Caribbean region. She seeks to better understand how the circulation of people, knowledge, commodities, and organisms generated environmental consequences throughout and beyond these networks. Her research ties these regions to broader global geopolitical and environmental processes, as well as to different forms of knowledge production involved in making the regions viable for military strategy, trade, settlement and natural resource exploitation from the 1800s-1960s.

Thinking about a major? Why not major in thinking? Rather than being concerned with a particular set of questions or a particular period of time, philosophy concerns itself with the nature of inquiry, thought, and argument itself, asking how each of these operates in the various areas of human life, from ethics and politics to the study of nature and reality. Dr. Justin Carré, Assistant Professor of Psychology has earned research funding from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC). His NSERC-funded research examines whether acute administration of testosterone increases aggressive behaviour in young men. His SSHRC-funded research examines the situational, psychological, and hormonal processes underlying sexual aggression. Dr. Carré's research has the potential to transform our understanding of the basic mechanisms underlying human aggression, which may ultimately help with the development of prevention and/or treatment programs aimed at reducing the expression of excessive forms of human aggression.

cognitive neuroscience, emotion, motivation, personality, psychological measurement, study design, theories, and healthy living. Courses on mental disorders include: Psychopathology, Counselling, and Childhood Disorders.

You can earn either a Bachelor of Arts (BA) or a Bachelor of Science (BSc) degree in Psychology. Your professors have expertise in areas that include both animal and human research. Some of the animal research areas include nerve-cell development, maternal care, and fear behaviours. You may also choose courses that qualify you to obtain a Certificate in Neuroscience alongside your BSc Psychology degree, or complete an Honours research thesis. As a senior student, you may be selected as a Teaching Assistant, helping other undergraduates. These hands-on experiences will give you a significant advantage if you plan to pursue graduate studies. All of your studies in Psychology give you a really good understanding of what makes people tick! That knowledge can be immensely helpful in any career you choose.

The Social Welfare and Social Development (SWSD) program is unique in Canada in both name and content. It focuses on social inequality and the groups, identified based on gender, race, class and Indigeneity, and underrepresented in recognition and the distribution of resources, opportunities, and power. Our students graduate with a thorough understanding of the causes and consequences of inequality in global, national, and local contexts, and an ability to formulate options for addressing these disparities. We offer a wide range of interdisciplinary courses, including a full-year seminar in community service-learning, one component of which involves volunteering with a local social agency.

Collaborative Social Welfare and Social Development/Social Service Worker program with Canadore College — On-campus delivery, 4-year

Through the collaborative Social Welfare and Social Development/Social Service Worker program, students earn an Honours Bachelor of Arts degree in Social Welfare and Social Development from Nipissing as well as a Social Service Worker diploma from Canadore College, which is conveniently located next door. You will attend Nipissing in your first, second, and fourth years. In your third-year, at Canadore, you will receive training in the practical knowledge and skills of the Social Service Worker profession. In your final semester (April-June) at Canadore, you will complete a 350-hour fieldwork placement at a local human service agency, allowing you to gain valuable experience in a workplace setting.

Degree Completion Program — On-campus delivery

Bachelor of Social Work (BSW — four-years)

Offered by the Faculty of Applied and Professional Studies

The goal of social work is to strengthen opportunities to improve the quality of life of individuals, families, groups and communities. Working directly with people who are, for example, dealing with personal challenges such as interpersonal violence, addiction or chronic illness, social workers uphold the right for these individuals to have access to resources to meet their needs. Working with an in-depth understanding of the ways in which social, cultural and institutional structures benefit and disadvantage various segments of society, social work's intention is to promote social development and fair and equal treatment and protection for all. A degree in social work will help you develop the right knowledge and skills that are necessary for practice by developing competencies in effecting change in a variety of situations that impact individuals, families, groups and communities. The program includes course work within social sciences (which may include psychology, social

welfare, religion, philosophy and sociology) as well as social work-specific content and a 900-hour field education practicum. The practicum provides students with the opportunity to apply theoretical learning to supervised work in a health and social care setting. In second-year, students are required to apply for admission to the professional years (Years 3 and 4).

Graduates of the program will meet the academic requirements necessary to register with the Ontario College of Social Workers and Social Service Workers. Registered members are regulated and must adhere to the Standard of Practice and Code of Ethics of the profession. Registration is highly significant in the field of social work as only registered College members can use the title "social worker" and/or "registered social worker".

Dr. David Zarifa, Associate Professor in Sociology holds the Canada Research Chair (CRC) in Life Course Transitions in Northern and Rural Communities. He examines how individuals in northern and rural areas acquire and maintain the skills they need to succeed in today's knowledge-driven economy. He is exploring whether some groups among northern and rural communities are under-represented in certain jobs; if the range and type of available schools and programs in northern and rural regions influence postsecondary choices and career pathways; and what unique challenges these regions face in attracting and retaining an innovative and skilled workforce. As well as helping Canadian youth into the labour market, launch their careers, and pursue success, his research will also change the way governments, policy makers, and education officials think about existing practices and policies.

OTHER TRANSFER POLICIES

Certified General Accountants of Ontario (CGA)

Applicants to the Bachelor of Commerce or Bachelor of Business Administration programs who have completed specific courses, with a minimum 60% average, through the Certified General Accountants of Ontario (CGA), will be eligible for advanced standing credit. Courses eligible for advanced standing consideration can be found at <a href="mailto:nipsis.n

Post-Diploma Accounting courses

Applicants with post diploma courses in Accounting where a grade of 70% or better has been achieved will be recommended to be of granted up to 15 transfer credits. The recommendation will be determined by the director or designate of the School of Business, decided by the Registrar's Office and will be consistent with existing transfer credit practices.

■ ADMISSION WITH ADVANCED STANDING OR TRANSFER CREDIT

Applicants deemed eligible for admission with advanced standing or transfer credit must submit recently-dated transcripts of their academic record directly to the Office of the Registrar. An Academic Calendar from their former institution(s) containing descriptions of the completed courses may be required. Those applicants who are eligible for advanced standing or transfer credits will be notified of their eligibility.

The application of advanced standing or transfer credits to a degree program will vary depending on the degree program and major to which the applicant is admitted. Changing degree programs or majors may mean a loss of or change to the credits awarded. Nipissing University degree residency requirements will apply.

■ APPLICANTS FROM ACCREDITED CANADIAN COLLEGES

Applicants to Nipissing University who have studied at an accredited Canadian college may qualify for admission to degree programs if they meet the minimum admissions requirements as outlined in the Ontario College of Applied Arts and Technology (CAAT) admission section above.

■ BIBLE COLLEGE APPLICANTS

Applicants from Bible Colleges and similarly religious based institutions that are accredited with the Association for Biblical Higher Education will follow the same policy for admission and advanced standing as for the CAATs.

No credit will be granted for courses in church education or administration, pastoral studies, or courses intended to promote a particular doctrinal or denominational belief.

■ MATURE STUDENT APPLICANTS

Applicants who, according to the Office of the Registrar, do not qualify for undergraduate admission as a regularly qualified applicant may be considered for admission consideration as a mature student if they:

- will be 20 years of age or older by the end of the semester in which they wish to enrol:
- have been away from formal education (secondary school, community college, etc.) for at least the previous two years; and
- are a Canadian citizen or permanent resident.

Mature student applicants to Bachelor of Science degrees or Bachelor of Arts degrees in Computer Science, Economics or Mathematics, must present the 4U or equivalent program specific prerequisites as listed in the Admission Chart in the Academic Calendar.

Mature student applicants to limited enrolment programs (Nursing and Physical and Health Education) are not able to apply for direct entry admission consideration to these programs. Mature student applicants interested in these programs may be admitted to another program and apply for transfer consideration for the following year. For transfer consideration applicants will need to present the 4U or equivalent program specific prerequisites as listed in the Admission Chart in the Academic Calendar.

Mature student applicants are still required to provide transcripts of marks for studies that have been previously completed or undertaken.

Mature students who qualify for admission can be admitted full-time on probation with a reduced course load to a maximum of 24 credits. Upon successful completion of the 18 credits and having cleared academic probation, mature students are eligible for a full 30 credit load status.

■ INTERNATIONAL APPLICANTS

Nipissing encourages qualified applicants from outside of Canada to consider applying to degree programs at Nipissing University. Interested applicants must apply for admission through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC). Applications, the appropriate application fee and the required official documents (transcripts and other documentation) must be received by the Office of the Registrar by April 1 for September admissions consideration. International applicants are not eligible for consideration under Nipissing University's Mature Student Admission Policy.

All international college and university transcripts must be assessed (Credential Evaluation Report, including a Course-By-Course Analysis) by World Education Services — wes.org/ca.

Applicants will be expected to show proof of English language proficiency and must have completed courses in specific academic disciplines depending upon the degree program to which they have applied. International applicants may qualify for transfer credit for previously-completed studies at non-Canadian universities.

Once an admission offer has been made, it is the applicant's responsibility to obtain the necessary documents required to study in Canada. A Study Permit is required to study at a Canadian university for periods of 6 months or longer. Note that citizens from some countries are also required to obtain a Temporary Resident Visa to enter Canada. For further information and application forms, international applicants should contact the nearest Canadian Embassy or Consular office or refer to the Citizenship Immigration Canada website cic.gc.ca/english/study/study.asp

International students studying at universities in Ontario are required to purchase mandatory medical health insurance. The insurance is known as UHIP (University Health Insurance Plan) and must be purchased upon arrival at Nipissing University.

Financial aid is not normally available to International applicants. International secondary school applicants are eligible for Nipissing's Entrance Scholarships starting at \$1,500 for "A" average students. Limited opportunities for on-campus employment are available for international students, after the first year of study is completed, via the International Work-Study Program. See Nipissing International for further details.

Proof of Proficiency in English

All applicants to Nipissing University undergraduate degree programs (excluding BEd) from countries where the dominant language of instruction is other than English are required to demonstrate proficiency in English for admission consideration.

Permanent Resident applicants whose first language is not English may be required to provide proof of proficiency in English. Permanent Resident applicants whose first language is not English but who have lived at least three years in Canada, or a country where English is the dominant language may be exempt.

Applicants can demonstrate proficiency in one of the following ways:

- Completion of three or more consecutive years of full-time education in English within Canada immediately prior to attending Nipissing University.
- Completion of three or more consecutive years of full-time education in English in a country other than Canada where English is the dominant language. These years must be immediately prior to attending Nipissing University.
- 3. Achieve the required proficiency level on one of the following tests of English language proficiency:
 - Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL): minimum score of 86 (iBT) with no score below 20 in any section. The Nipissing University TOEFL institution code is #3614
 - International English Language Test Service (IELTS): minimum overall band score of 6.5 with no band below 6.0.
 - The Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB): minimum overall score of 90%.
 - Canadian Academic English Language Assessment (CAEL): minimum score of 60.
 - Pearson Test of English (PTE) Academic: minimum overall score of 55 with a minimum score of 55 in writing.
 - Cambridge English: Advanced (CAE): minimum overall score of 176 with no less than 176 in each skill (Reading, Writing, Listening, and Speaking) and Use of English.

- Completion of an International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma with a minimum score
 of 5 or better in HL or SL English A: Literature or HL or SL English A: Language
 and Literature.
- Graduate from a regionally accredited US secondary school and achieve a minimum score of 4 or better in Advanced Placement (AP) English Language & Composition or English Literature & Composition.
- Achieve a minimum grade of B in GCSE, IGCSE or GCE Ordinary Level English
 Literature or English Language, a minimum grade of C in GCE A Level or AS
 Level or AICE or CAPE English or English Language, or a minimum score of M3 in
 Cambridge Pre-U English.
- Achieve a minimum score of 75% or better in the All India Senior Secondary School Certificate (ISSC) Core or Functional English or the Indian School Certificate (ISC) English, issued by the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations (CISCE).

Applicants who have met all of Nipissing University's admission requirements except for the English language proficiency requirement can enroll in an EAP program. Applicants who enroll in one of the following programs will receive a conditional offer of admission. By successfully completing the program level indicated below, applicants can begin their studies at Nipissing University without further testing.

UOIT English Language Centre: Level 5

AYJ Global EAP Program: Highest Level

Brock University's Intensive English Language Program: Level 5

Applicants who have successfully completed EAP programs associated with other Canadian universities and obtained that university's minimum level for admission consideration may also be considered to have met Nipissing University's English language proficiency requirement.




